This event is organized by the Refugee Health Unit (RHU) of the UC San Diego Center for Community Health (CCH), within the Community Engagement and Dissemination and Implementation Program at the Altman Clinical and Translational Research Institute in collaboration with the San Diego Refugee Communities Coalition (SDRCC). The County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency, the Herbert Wertheim School of Public Health and Human Longevity Science, the UC San Diego Department of Pediatrics and UC San Diego Health.

OUR GOAL

The goal of the Refugee and Immigrant Health Summit is to foster meaningful collaboration among community leaders, ethnic-led organizations, researchers, healthcare providers, and public health practitioners to co-create actionable strategies that address social determinants of health challenges and promote well-being in refugee and immigrant communities. The panel and breakout discussions will include community and cross-sector perspectives on the overarching topics of healthcare navigation and cultural humility, mental health, and housing as a foundational issue. Participants will also participate in the unveiling of the Blessing Boat, an art installation in collaboration between CCH and Tre Borden/Co as part of the James Irvine Leadership Award received by Blanca Melendrez and Amina Sheik Mohamed in honor of their work advancing health equity through collaborative, community-led initiatives.

It is our hope that participants will use the summit as an opportunity to foster further collaborations to advance health equity and well-being in refugee and immigrant communities in San Diego and beyond. Thank you for being here!



The Refugee Health Unit (RHU) was launched in 2017 to respond to the emerging needs of the growing number of refugees in San Diego County. The RHU offers extensive proficiency in collaborating with local immigrant and refugee communities. It currently provides backbone support for the San Diego Refugee Communities Coalition (SDRCC) comprised of local ethnic-led communitybased organizations, and serves as the lead agency for the Afghan Refugee School Impact and Afghan Youth Mentoring (ARSI/AYM) program, overseeing program delivery for refugees statewide. It spearheads training and technical assistance support for 50+ ethnic-led community-based organizations in partnership with regional lead agencies, facilitated through the establishment of statewide and regional Communities of Practice. ARSI/AYM direct services have reached over 3,500 immigrant and refugee families and youth statewide since its inception in 2023. The RHU focuses on helping refugee communities overcome health inequities and improve their agency, so individuals feel represented as a part of the larger community. This work is done through partnerships with Ethnic Community Based Organizations (ECBOs) to facilitate greater involvement and representation with the goal of ensuring equitable access to healthcare for all Californian refugees and immigrants. By deploying evidence-based health practices and translational research, RHU programs aim to achieve health equity by focusing on all aspects of the social determinants of health.

The Center for Community Health is a Center within the Population Science and Community Engagement Unit at the UC San Diego Altman Clinical and Translational Research Institute (ACTRI). CCH plays a pivotal role in transforming scientific discoveries into real-world health improvements. Programs target social and systemic factors affecting health through research and action to ensure equitable health opportunities for all.

ACTRI envisions a future in which everyone, irrespective of their social, economic or cultural background, can achieve their full health potential. To accomplish this vision, ACTRI fosters the principles of inclusion, diversity, equity and accessibility (IDEA) across programs; inspires change–makers and their disruptive innovations; provides resources and infrastructure that supports clinical translational science; and develops a workforce that bridges critical research gaps.

Abdi Abdullahi, MBA is the Chief of the Refugee Programs Bureau and the California State Refugee Coordinator, where he manages federal funding and oversees the implementation of California's refugee resettlement plan. He is responsible for developing and administering programs that support refugees, such as Refugee Cash Assistance, ensuring they receive the necessary services to achieve self-sufficiency. Abdi also coordinates with both public and private resources and works closely with federal partners, including ORR and PRM, to address the needs of refugee populations. Before joining the State, Abdi began his public service career in 2005 with the County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency, where he held multiple roles, including County Refugee Coordinator and Refugee Employment Services Manager. In these roles, he offered policy expertise, developed community networks, and provided support for refugees and immigrants in the region. Abdi has also held leadership positions, including Chair of the County Refugee Coordinators and Vice-Chair of the State Advisory Council on Refugee Assistance and Services. As a former refugee from Somalia, Abdi is deeply committed to advocating for equity, social justice, and inclusive practices for refugees. He understands firsthand the challenges refugees face and is dedicated to fostering relationships with organizations that serve these communities. Abdi holds an MBA from the University of Phoenix.



Amina Sheik Mohamed, MPH is the Director and founder of the Refugee Health Unit (RHU) within the UC San Diego Center for Community Health (CCH). Amina is recognized for her work advancing health equity in San Diego County. As passionate public health leader, Amina collaborates with Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) communities to promote health, community agency, and equitable access to opportunities. As the founder of both the Refugee Health Unit and the Youth Advisory Council (YAC), Amina has led initiatives that improve access to health resources in low-income communities. She excels in building coalitions, fund development, and implementing community-led projects. Her past work includes directing the Interfaith-Wellness Program, launching a Women's Only Swimming Project at the YMCA, and managing the African American Campaign for the Network for a Healthy California. Amina is a dedicated and innovative leader, committed to making a positive impact on public health locally and globally. She has received several honors, including the UC San Diego Changemaker Award (2019) and the Union Bank and KPBS Women's History Month Local Heroes Award (2013), and has spoken at major conferences like the American Public Health Association (APHA) Annual Meeting. Amina holds a Master of Public Health from Walden University and a Bachelor's in Health Science from San Diego State University. She is also an alumni of the Rockwood Building Power Fellowship program.



Blanca Melendrez, MA leverages two decades of leadership as the Executive Director of the UC San Diego Center for Community Health (CCH). She is deeply committed to addressing health disparities and advocating for health equity within communities of color. Blanca's work is rooted in personal experiences as an immigrant from Mexico, facing firsthand the challenges within healthcare systems and the impacts of the social determinants of health. Blanca has developed various health programs and the establishment of critical community-based coalitions, securing over \$80 million in funding to enhance community health and reduce disparities. This work is underpinned by a deepseated belief in social justice and equity, driving her to advocate for health as a fundamental right for all. Blanca's journey at CCH began with the foundational Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) - Education Program, initially through the 5-a-Day pilot in partnership with the California Department of Public Health. The ¡Más Fresco! Nutrition Incentive Program stands out as a flagship effort, marking the first of its kind in the University of California System to combat food insecurity through a collaborative approach involving community, food systems, and health systems. Furthermore, under Blanca's leadership, CCH has been instrumental in establishing and leading various community-based collective impact coalitions and initiatives that embed just research and evaluation of programs, including the San Diego Refugee Communities Coalition, Advancing Health Literacy, Healthy4You, Youth Advisory Council, and San Diego County Childhood Obesity Initiative.



Dr. Crystal Cené, MD is the Chief Administrative Officer for Health Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion at UC San Diego Health and Associate Chief Medical Officer for Health Equity. In her dual, complementary role, she's focused on creating an equitable, diverse and inclusive environments for students, trainees, faculty, staff and patients. Dr. Cené is responsible for the vision, leadership and strategic planning of UC San Diego Health's justice, equity, diversity and inclusion initiatives. Prior to her current role, Dr. Cené was the system director for health equity and the director of the Program on Health Disparities at University of North Carolina (UNC) Health. She is a nationally recognized health services and health disparities researcher. Her research focuses on evaluating and implementing solutions that enhance patient and family-centered care, focusing on the disparities in care by race and socioeconomic status. She has held leadership roles in national and international organizations throughout her career, including the American Heart Association, the Society of General Internal Medicine, and the Women's Health Initiative. Dr. Cené is a practicing general internal medicine physician. She completed her medical residency at Yale University and earned her medical degree at East Carolina University. She completed a three-year clinical research fellowship and received her Masters in Public Health from John Hopkins University.



Dr. Davey Smith, MD, MAS is an infectious disease specialist and prolific translational researcher with a focus of turning lab discoveries into better health. He has published over 400 scientific publications. Since 2022, Dr. Smith was recognized by Clarivate as being in the top 1% of researchers in the world by scientific citations. Since the pandemic started in 2019, Dr. Smith has been engaged in the international effort to find safe and effective treatments, including being the international protocol co-chair for the ACTIV-2 treatment study, which is a part of the US government's response to COVID-19. In 2023, Dr. Smith became the Assistant Vice Chancellor of The Altman Clinical and Translational Research Institute (ACTRI) where he leads a team of scientists to tackle difficult biomedical challenges. Having his breadth of expertise allows him to better understand and overcome scientific and medical roadblocks. A good example of this is his recent work that showed how ChatGPT was better and more empathetic at answering patient queries than physicians (JAMA IM 2023) and how these new AI tools need to improve how a patient feels, functions or survives to be most useful (JAMA 2023).



Etleva Bejko, MA, is the Executive Director at Survivor of Torture

International. Etleva is a highly respected immigration services leader with over 20 years of experience in the field. Throughout her career, she has responded to humanitarian crises, rallied community groups, and built programs and teams that have served generations of refugees and immigrants throughout the San Diego County. Throughout her professional career, Etleva has worked closely with local and federal partners to address the barriers immigrant populations face and collaboratively improve their health, safety, and overall well-being. She has developed successful strategies for providing services to clients, while representing them and the organization in the community. She has built and maintained partnerships with various stakeholders across the County to ensure genuine immigrant and refugee equity and integration. During the border crisis of 2018, Etleva was a key leader in coordinating what is now an official migrant shelter, serving released asylum seekers and reuniting them with their families. As asylum seekers were detained and then released without coordination, leaving them stranded in San Diego with no resources, the need for a shelter grew overnight. Etleva began work on the ground, building systems to manage the influx of needy individuals, all while securing the resources required to support the newcomers. Etleva holds a master's degree in Nonprofit Leadership and Management from the University of San Diego.



Farida Erikat has been involved with the Majdal: Arab Community Center of San Diego since 2021 and currently serves as the Program Manager. Farida was born and raised in San Diego and comes from a large Palestinian family. She graduated from UC Irvine where she studied Psychology and Education, with a special interest in working with youth populations at the intersection of social work and education. Through her work at the Majdal Center, Farida seeks to support the development of her community, as well as help grow the next generation of youth leaders.



Farhat Popal, MPP is the Assistant Director of Refugee and Immigrant Health at the UC San Diego Center for Community Health, Refugee Health Unit. In prior roles, Farhat served as the Immigrant Affairs Manager for the City of San Diego and held roles at the U.S. Department of State advising on gender-based violence globally and human rights programming. Her experience also includes evaluating the efficiency and effectiveness of local and federal government programs. Farhat studied Political Science/International Relations and History of the Near East at the University of California, San Diego and earned a Master's degree in Public Policy from the University of California, Berkeley.



Dr. Janine Young, MD is an academic general pediatrician at the University of California San Diego, Professor of Pediatrics, and Division Chief of Academic General Pediatrics, Newborn Medicine, and Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics. She is also the Martin T. Stein Endowed Chair in **Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics.** She was an undergraduate at Columbia University, received her medical training at Harvard Medical School, and pediatric residency training at the Boston Combined Program and UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland. Her career focus is health care and access to care for immigrants and refugees and has written widely and presented talks nationally regarding topics that include the development of standard of care immigrant health medical screening guidelines, the evaluation and treatment of unaccompanied and accompanied immigrant children, pediatric female genital cutting, and medical-immigration law partnerships. She is the UCSD site PI for the Minnesota Department of Public Health/Centers for Disease Control Centers of Excellence in Newcomer Health and is a Medical Advisor addressing social determinants of health for the CDC Division of Healthcare Quality Promotion/Surveillance Branch. She is a founding member and on the Board of the Society of Refugee Healthcare Providers and is a founding member of the American Academy of Pediatrics Council of Immigrant Child and Family Health. She is a certified Spanish and French medical interpreter and loves to travel, when she can.



Dr. Jennifer Nations, PhD is currently the Managing Director of Homelessness Hub at UC San Diego, a research lab in the Department of Urban Studies and Planning. Dr. Nations leads multiple research studies at Homelessness Hub, including research on the connection between tenant rights education and wellbeing. Before her current position, Dr. Nations held postdoctoral fellowship appointments with the Fiscal Democracy Project at UC San Diego and the Scholars Strategy Network, an organization focused on bridging the gap between academic research and policy application. Dr. Nations studies inequality and the distribution of public and philanthropic resources in multiple domains, with the goal of improving service delivery and public policy to support a more equitable, just society.



Dr. Jennifer Tuteur, MD serves as the Chief Medical Officer for the County of San Diego's Health and Human Services Agency, Medical Care Services, supporting access to quality, timely and evidence-based care. Jennifer is passionate about improving the health of underserved communities. She earned her BA from Yale University and her MD at the University of Missouri. She worked as a Program Analyst in the Office of the Surgeon General and completed her residency in Family and Community Medicine in Minnesota. Jennifer braved a change in climate, moving to San Diego to hold leadership roles at Community Health Centers. As Medical Director of the Low Income Health Program, Jennifer piloted mental health integration and expansion of healthcare coverage prior to the ACA. Jennifer serves as a Board Member of Mama's Kitchen and San Diego Wellness Collaborative. She enjoys hiking and skiing with her family. Besides the wilderness, Petco Park is her favorite place to relax.



Dr. Kristin Brownell, MD, MPH has worked as a family physician caring for women, children, adult, and pregnant people in City Heights' diverse urban underserved area since 2007. Dr. Brownell trained at UC San Diego School of Medicine and serves as core Faculty with Family Health Centers of San Diego Family Residency (FHCSD) Program. For the Residency she leads the young doctors' community medicine rotation, Global Health Area of Concentration and served as FHCSD refugee health provider champion. Since serving in the Peace Corps, and later training in public health at San Diego State University (SDSU). Dr. Brownell has appreciated the value of learning from her patients and their community, to guide advocacy, & public policy especially in newcomers. She is a past president, and current delegate for of the San Diego Academy of Family Physicians (SDAFP). She is curious and passionate about social determinants of health, health equity, social justice, policy, and wellness and sustainability in medicine.



Nao Kabashima is the co-founder and Executive Director of Karen Organization of San Diego (KOSD). She is originally from Japan and first came to the U.S. as a graduate student. After she earned her master's degree in political science at California State University, Chico, in 2008, she began volunteering for the Refugee Resettlement Program at Jewish Family Service of San Diego and started to meet with many Karen and Karenni refugee families. In 2009, she co-founded KOSD with Karen community leaders to meet the urgent needs of refugees from Burma in San Diego. She served as the Secretary and Chair of the San Diego Refugee Forum in 2012–2013 and is currently serving the Partnership for Advancement of New Americans (PANA) as a Board Chair. She currently sits at the San Diego Mayor Todd Gloria's AAPI Advisory Board. She is one of the awardees for the City of San Diego's Women of Distinction in 2024.



Noun Abdulaziz is a Community Organizer & Health Researcher within the United Women of East Africa Support Team (UWEAST) a member of the San Diego Refugee Communities Coalition (SDRCC). Nouns has a BA in Sociology and a strong background in public health advocacy, mental health education, and health nutrition research. As a Sudanese Egyptian immigrant, she brings a unique perspective to her work. Noun's contributions have been recognized through various awards, including a nomination for the 2018 California Endowment Youth Awards and the Outstanding Youth/Student Volunteer award from the 2019 National Philanthropy Day Honorary Committee. She was also highlighted as a "Citizen of the World" in a U.S. News article and received the 2020 Student Scholar award from the American Heart Association. Currently, Noun works with the San Diego Refugee Communities Coalition Policy Council and has served as a research consultant for the UC San Diego Refugee Health Unit, where she has presented and led numerous research initiatives.



Reba Meigs, MPA serves as the Senior Project Officer at the UC San Diego Center for Community Health (CCH). Reba has nearly 20 years of public health experience at the state and county level, as well as in academic and non-profit settings. She has extensive strategic planning and implementation experience in federal and state funding models, evaluation frameworks, training and skill development methodologies, and community collaboration. Reba has designed, implemented, and evaluated large-scale community-based programs and has provided evidence-based capacity building guidance for health policies, legislative bills, systems, and environmental change initiatives throughout the state of California. Dr. Tala Al-Rousan, MD is a physician-scientist and Assistant professor at the Herbert Wertheim School of Public Health at the University of California San Diego. She is the Founding Director of the Displacement & Health research initiative at UC San Diego. She seeks to examine the intersectionality of displacement and health and leads clinical and behavioral health trials to mitigate these disparities and inform policy design.



Dr. Zuhra Alokozai, MD is a **Community Health Worker** at the **Union of Pan Asian Communities (UPAC)**. She is fluent in Dari, English, Farsi, Pashto, Urdu, Turkish, and Uzbek. Prior to her role with UPAC, she served as a certified nurse assistant with First Promise Care Service, where she cared for patients in a nursing facility. Zuhra has over two decades of experience working as a medical practitioner and earned her medical degree from Kabul University in her home country. She served as Chief of the Hematology department from 2001 to 2017 where she oversaw a 30-bed unit, treated adult patients including those with leukemia, and trained new doctors in three-year rotations. Since moving to the US, she has continued to serve her community through her work as a nurse and a community health worker.
